- Spiral pruning demonstration.
- Farmers field afforestation results 68 years later. Carbon credits and afforestation projects, what challenges will you have in developing your prescription
- Juvenile spacing and 3rd lift pruning results and a pruning demonstration using technology to improve productivity and reduce costs.
- Up-date on Western White Pine resistance, how can you reduce pruning treatment costs?
- Up-date on Western Red Cedar- can you use browse resistant cedar to reduce your plantation establishment costs? Come and take the taste test
- VR and lessons learned from the past 10 years. How to get the best bang for your wind throw pruning dollars?

Along with the silviculture practices, join us in Port Alberni and experience some of the Alberni Valley Heritage. We plan on a First Nations Traditional salmon barbecue, and we will be riding the Alberni Pacific Steam Train out to the McLean Mill heritage site, where we will have more silviculture information, a mill tour, several other fun contests and prizes, dinner, and hear from our dinner speaker (tentative) the Minister of Forests and Range, Pat Bell.
